Monica had an 84% ranking well in excess of Angela Copson 78%, David Bedwell and Claire Martin 77%, Malcolm Weir 76%, David Oxland and Mandy Vernon 75%.




Figure 1: Proposed new BMAF structure

British Masters Athletics Federation is an organisation bringing together area clubs, like Midland Masters, to encourage masters' athletics on a national stage. It provides championships, websites and hosts the club membership portal. Strictly speaking, as a club member you are not a member of BMAF but your club is affiliated, representing your views. In recent times it has got a bit confusing with new websites (mastersathletics.co.uk) and, until recently, a clunky Opentrack online championship entry and member subscription process (Opentrack much improved this year). The BMAF executive has also been a bit dysfunctional but differences in opinion about national direction go back to its formation. Politics have been part of athletics since Roman days. In the 20th century we were arguing about the status of amateur athletics and calling veterans "masters". Recently there have been discussions about transgender, disability and race walking under B-rules (a bent knee or "power walking")

BMAF is seeking approval to move to a limited company, to be proposed and voted on at their AGM. This would be a non-profit organisation that does not reward or pay directors or volunteers and recycles any money back into the sport. The main argument is to limit liability to the directors (including those from area clubs) now the organisation has a turnover heading towards 6 figures.

BMAF has already separated operational matters, including the running of championships, to BMAF Service Ltd, a new company formed 3 years ago. This is a sleek organisation run by volunteers responsible for events, marketing, websites and IT systems. The new BMAF Ltd will provide the governance structure looking after the business whilst BMAF Services will provide operational services looking after the athletics. Two companies may merge in the future but the thinking is it would be better to separate structures. We will continue to have an external BMAF Council overseeing the whole enterprise. Area clubs will provide directors

to BMAF Ltd and members to the BMAF Council. Club representation and oversight is very important to maintain.

I am a director of BMAF Services Ltd, one of 3 directors. My role is largely managing payments and running the monthly meetings as chairman. I am an observer on BMAF executive which has been an "interesting" experience over the last year, not helped by all meetings being via Zoom. By contrast BMAF Services meetings are quite simple due to their operational nature rather than debating policy and direction.

Whatever the result of the BMAF AGM vote on the new incorporated structure, there will still be a need for further work. The Articles of Association will require discussion, fine tuning and approval by the area clubs. The vote is to give approval on the direction and not on the final entity. An interesting next chapter of UK masters athletics awaits.


